VALUES

LEADERSHIP

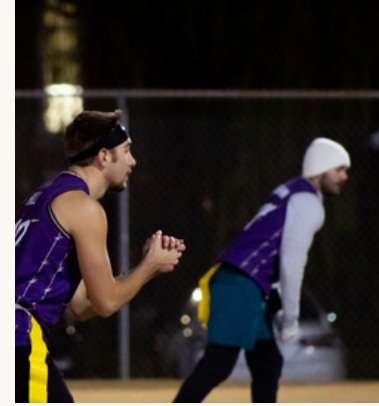
SOCIAL

While an undergraduate member of a fraternity or sorority, students have the chance to take part in various social events. These events are planned with safety, MTSU's policies, and state laws in mind to ensure a safe yet fun event. Social events can include date parties, formals, mixers, parent weekends, and more.

INTERFRATERNITY COUNCIL (IFC)

The Interfraternity Council serves as the governing body for the 10 fraternities at MTSU. IFC is committed to building men of character, developing leaders, promoting scholarship, and enriching lives through community involvement.

How to Join: IFC fraternities hold recruitment events throughout the school year as part of their open structure recruitment process. Men interested in joining an IFC fraternity can attend recruitment events that typically take place in the first few weeks of both the fall and spring semesters.

NATIONAL PAN-HELLENIC COUNCIL (NPHC)

The National Pan-Hellenic Council of MTSU is a self-governing body that represents the nine nationally recognized historically Black fraternities and sororities known as the Divine 9. The emphasis of the council is to contribute to the political, economic, spiritual, social, intellectual, moral welfare, and multicultural life at MTSU and the surrounding community.

How to Join: Each NPHC fraternity and sorority brings in new members at various times of the year through a process called membership intake. Typically, an organization looking to expand membership will hold information sessions to discuss membership requirements.

PANHELLENIC COUNCIL (CPH)

The Panhellenic Council is the governing body of the National Panhellenic Conference organizations on campus. CPH is an organization that values academic enhancement, friendship, development of leadership skills, and the opportunity to serve the community.

How to Join: Most women join CPH sororities through the formal recruitment process that takes place every fall semester. There are also often continuous open bidding opportunities that take place throughout the school year. Information about CPH recruitment can be found at the council's website and on social media.

COUNCIL PROGRAMS

CRASH THE COMMONS



At this event, fraternities and sororities team up with each other to participate in a friendly competition of fun yard games. Free food and fair attractions are also provided, and the entire MTSU community is invited to come participate. After the games, there is a glow dance party with a DJ to end the night. Crash the Commons is the perfect event to attend if you are a new student at MTSU and are interested in joining a fraternity or sorority.



GREEK WEEK

Greek Week is a time for the fraternity and sorority life community to come together and celebrate their shared values and goals. Usually taking place over a week in the spring semester, Greek Week's schedule includes values-based activities, volunteer opportunities, friendly competitions, and fun activities that allow fraternities and sororities to grow closer together.



EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS

FSL ACADEMY

The Fraternity and Sorority Leadership Academy is a one-day program designed specifically for chapter executive board members. Each participant has the opportunity to attend specific sessions that focus on his or her leadership position.



NEW MEMBER EDUCATION

New members participate in an educational series hosted by the Fraternity & Sorority Life office that focuses on what it means to be a member of the FSL community. New members meet multiple times during their new member period to cover topics such as time management, hazing prevention, alcohol and drug education, sexual assault prevention, and bystander intervention.



TRUE BLUE ACCREDITATION

The True Blue Accreditation is designed to allow chapters to create goals within their fraternity/sorority that promote the ideals of their organization and of MTSU. Chapters meet in the fall semester to present a detailed outline of how the organization worked to achieve their goals and how they will change or continue those goals.



A WEEK IN THE LIFE



MONDAY - THURSDAY

The week typically consists of sisterhood and brotherhood events, study hours, and leadership meetings. Philanthropy events and other organizational events also take place during the week. Fraternities and sororities prioritize academics by hosting study parties and providing academic support for students.



FRIDAY - SATURDAY

Weekends are filled with community service, social, and chapter events. Some of these activities might include mixers, date parties, chapter formals, and chapter retreats. Chapter programming also often collaborate with campus or local resources. You will also see many of our FSL members at MTSU athletics events over the weekend. Go Blue Raiders!



SUNDAY

Most chapters on campus hold individual chapter meetings during the evening on Sundays. Chapter meetings typically last for a few hours and consist of important chapter updates, sisterhood and brotherhood activities, guest speakers, and chapter business.

FAQ

HOW WILL MY STUDENT BENEFIT FROM JOINING A FRATERNITY OR SORORITY?

Your student will have many advantages from joining the FSL community, including a support system of sisters or brothers, academic resources and support, leadership opportunities, encouragement to get involved on campus, and opportunities to give back to MTSU and the Murfreesboro community.

HOW WILL MY JOINING A FRATERNITY/SORORITY AFFECT MY STUDENT ACADEMICALLY?

Academic success is a priority for fraternities and sororities. As student organizations, our chapters know that academic achievement is the number one priority for students in college. Organizations support scholarship by providing academic resources such as advisor support, study group, scholarship opportunities, and recognition.

WHAT IS THE FINANCIAL OBLIGATION?

Chapters collect dues and membership fees from every member. Most organizations have initiation/new member fees as well as semester dues, which go towards philanthropic events, education events, social events, membership recruitment, and parent/alumni events, to name a few. Many chapters offer payment plans and scholarship opportunities to help members meet financial obligations.

WHAT ABOUT HAZING?

Hazing is contrary to the missions and values of fraternity and sorority life, and there is a no tolerance policy for hazing on MTSU's campus. The state of Tennessee, MTSU, and all national fraternities and sororities have policies against hazing.

GLOSSARY

ACTIVE: A member of a fraternity or sorority who has been initiated and is currently in college.

ALUMNUS/ALUMNI: An initiated member of a fraternity or sorority who has received their undergraduate degree.

BID: A formal invitation to join a fraternity or sorority.

CHAPTER: A chartered undergraduate or alumni group that is recognized by the international fraternity.

COLONY: A fraternal membership which has received approval from the university and recognition from one of the Greek governing councils but is in a trial period with their national organization and their governing council.

FRATERNITY: A Greek letter brotherhood or sisterhood

INFORMAL/OPEN RECRUITMENT:

The unstructured recruitment process by which fraternities and sororities take members throughout the academic year

LEGACY: A prospective member whose grandparents, mother/father, or sister/brother is an alumni of a fraternity/sorority

NATIONAL PANHELLENIC CONFERENCE (NPC): An organization composed of 26 national women's sororities; the organization that our CPH operates under

NATIONAL PAN-HELLENIC COUNCIL (NPHC): A collaborative organization of 9 historically Black Greek letter organizations, commonly referred to as the "Divine Nine"

NEW MEMBER: Any person who has accepted an invitation for membership to a fraternity or sorority but has not yet been initiated

NEW MEMBER PROGRAM/PERIOD: The period of time before an initiation when new members learn about their fraternity or sorority

NORTH-AMERICAN INTERFRATERNITY CONFERENCE (NIC): An organization composed of more than 50 national men's fraternities; the organization that our IFC council operates under

PHILANTHROPY:

Fundraising projects for local and national charitable organizations that are supported by fraternities and sororities

POTENTIAL NEW MEMBERS: Any person who is not a current, initiated member of a fraternity or sorority

RECRUITMENT: The process of active members recruiting potential new members to become members of fraternity and sorority life

SORORITY: A Greek letter sisterhood
